Corinna Ridley, Jacinta Agostinelli and Lynne Matheson met with Lynne Fitzpatrick and Liz Davidson on Friday Sept 29, (12.30 -3.30) to provide 'critical friends' input to the draft documents. Written feedback from three TAFEs was discussed as were general concerns raised by VALBEC committee members. Specific units were examined for consistency, clarity and accuracy with amendments and changes being noted and actioned. Notes from this meeting will be tabled at the PSC meeting on October 12. The CMM professional development sessions in October and November will provide opportunities to examine to documents with their practical implications and we urge members to attend.

Training and assessment for adults with low literacy skills: a workshop for adult literacy teachers, trainers and managers.
