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Committee News

1. New VALBEC Committee meets

The first meeting of the new VALBEC committee was held on Wednesday 26 June. It was a full meeting and members contributed a range of ideas for professional development and projects that we will continue to discuss and make plans for terms 3 & 4.

Sandra Wolfe and Linno Rhodes attended the 'Confident Communities' ACE Aotearoa and ALA conference in Wellington, NZ, June 18 -20 and met colleagues from both Australia and NZ at what was a vibrant and interesting Australasian conference.

Jan Hagston was interviewed on SYNFM radio to to talk about the Programme for the International Assessment of Adult Competencies (PIAAC) results of adult literacy levels in Australia.

The 'Building Strength with Numeracy Resource' has been receiving positive feedback and we have had to increase bandwidth to accommodate the number of downloads.

2. 2013 International Year of Statistics

- Of the hundreds of thousands of women who die during pregnancy or childbirth each year, 90 per cent live in Africa and Asia, the majority from causes for which we have highly effective interventions.
- Nearly two in three, or 63.2 per cent, of Australian adults were considered either overweight or obese, with more men than women falling into that category.
- The top long-term health conditions experienced in Australia in 2011-12 were:
 - o arthritis 3.3 million people (14.8%)
 - o mental and behavioural conditions 3.0 million people (13.6%)
 - o asthma 2.3 million people (10.2%)
 - heart disease 1.0 million people (4.7%)
- In 2011-12, the average Australian man was 175.6 cm tall and weighed 85.9 kg. The average Australian woman was 161.8 cm tall and weighed 71.1 kg.
- Half of parents driving their children to UK primary schools live under a mile (1.6 km) away, walk-to-school campaigners say. In Victoria, 70% of Victorian children are driven to school even though 80% live within 3km of their school.

3. What about your own statistsics?

Humans have their own statistics. We can measure so much of ourselves:

- Have your students take photos of each other on their mobile phones just like the two positions of the Vitruvian Man. (Look this up on the internet - Wikipedia will do!)
- · Email the photos to themselves.
- Print the photos or use Printshop superimpose them over each other





- Estimate the position of the navel and using a compass or the drawing tools, draw in the circle and the square, a la da Vinci.
- How do they measure up?

What I'm reading – something out of the box

We recently pulled some boxes out of 'storage' – the roof space - and discovered treasures. Well 'Treasure Island' given to me on my thirteenth birthday among others. Others included 'Cloudstreet' by Tim Winton. It evokes memories of a long ago Australia. He captured a sense of my early childhood in the rambling tale and my first view of Perth was in the sixties as he describes it. Another was the 'The Man' (1967) a fanciful tale of a man who becomes America's first black president. Who would have thought? I've just re-read 'Oscar and Lucinda' – with that image from the film of the glass cathedral coming up the river strong in my mind.

Then gritty novels like Ian Rankin's with the dark side of Edinburgh, which I visited many times long ago (Edinburgh, not the dark side). And the latest John le Carre, 'A Delicate Truth', which I'm holding off starting, waiting for the right time! Superficially his books were about spies.
